

# Chapter 2: Be Quiet

## TVs

## I Radios

**Problem:** You're celebrating your child's 10th birthday by having a party at a state park campsite with friends and family. Music is part of the enjoyment.

What can you do to show good campground etiquette?

1. Play music for the party, but make sure it doesn't extend beyond the boundary of the campsite.
2. Increase the volume of the music inside the RV only—and keep the windows closed—for anyone who wants to enjoy it at a higher volume.
3. Next time you're throwing a loud party, think about finding a more isolated campsite by boondocking away from everyone.

## I Dogs

**Problem:** You're at a county run campground and want to play fetch with your dogs. The county has rules stating dogs must always remain on a leash 6 feet or shorter.

What can you do to show good campground etiquette?

## Children

**Problem:** You're well aware that your children love to play outside when camping. You also understand how loud they can be at times and how they always like to push the rules.

What can you do to show good campground etiquette?

1. Review campground etiquette rules with your children before and while playing outside.
2. If your children are having trouble staying away from other campsites while being excessively loud, tell them to play inside the RV until they understand how to keep the volume down.
3. Consider taking your children to a part of the campground with minimal people to play.

## Generators

**Problem:** You're staying at a campground that has generator quiet hours from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m., and it's a hot summer day. You want air conditioning to cool down.

What can you do to show good campground etiquette?

3. Consider dispersed camping away from other people next time.
