

# Chapter 3: Be Safe



Before you head out on your next camping trip, remember to keep safety at the forefront of your mind. As discussed in the “Be Safe” section of the Campground Etiquette course video, safety can be related to wildlife, campfires, pets, driving, and other topics. ## | Firewood and Campfires

Always use locally-sourced, heat-treated firewood from the area where you're camping. This prevents the spread of invasive species.

When you're done enjoying your campfire, completely put it out by pouring water on it or covering it with dirt so there are no embers.

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## | Wildlife

Keep a minimum distance of 25 yards from the majority of wildlife. When dealing with predators, such as wolves and bears, keep a minimum distance of 100 yards. Each park or campground may have different rules for specific wildlife within its boundaries.

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Reminder: Do not feed wildlife. This makes them reliant on humans for food and can create unsafe interactions that other campers may have to deal with in the future.
